

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IN THE HEADLIGHTS



Planting A Seed By Sam Schwalm,

It's hard to point to any one thing that creates the interest between men and cars. We all end up there in different ways. My father had a red 1951 MG TD. My earliest distinct memory of cars was driving from Wichita Kansas to Lincoln Nebraska at night in a driving rain storm. Dad had to crank the windshield

wipers by hand and the convertible top leaked a little with the motor whining

away and the rain pounding on the windshield. I think that may have planted the seeds.

My Dad is a car guy. He always did his own repairs and loved to look at and read about the classic models, particularly British cars. He still has that 1951 MG TD. It was being stored in barn back in the 60's, but the barn blew down in a tornado and damaged it. My Grandfather towed it to where we were living in Renton Washington, where it became a fixture in the garage. Dad would work on it now and then, but with kids, a job, and finishing parts of the house he didn't make much progress. When we moved back to Nebraska, that MG trailed along with the rest of the family. It has spent several decades in Dad's garage since then, he'll spend some time working on it now and then, but chances are that it will move to my garage one of these days. That car is just as much a member of the family as anyone else.

The other family car that I bonded with as a child was a 1957 Buick Roadmaster. I spent my grade school years in Renton, where there were lots and lots of rain days. When I got tired of the house, I would go out in the Roadmaster and it would most often become a spaceship of some kind or other. It had lots of buttons and knobs to use as space ship controls. Dad wasn't always happy having to readjust everything.

When I started driving in the early 70s, Dad got me a 1963 Olds 98. A very large car, especially by today's standards. I'm sure the attraction was that it was a big box of steel to absorb any mistakes that I might have made. I didn't make any major ones, but I did manage to inadvertently do a 180 with it on a wet road. A bit too heavy on the pedal for the turn I was making.

Over the years, Dad has had cars come and go - mostly old pickups, Buicks, and Cadillacs. He came across a 1962 MGA Mk II in the early 70s, which took up residence in my garage about 20 years ago. A 1966 MGB hardtop also found a home in my brother's garage.

Men see the art in the machine. If you have ever gone to the classic



car show here in Payson, you will see a wide variety of art on display including cars from all eras, from the early days with big sweeping fenders and bug-eye lights to the eras of fins and muscle cars. Some are meticulously restored to original show room condition, or better. Some have the original appearance, but have had the power plant replaced with more muscle. Some have had extra curves and bends added to create something unique and beautiful.

We hope that you join us on May12th & 13th to admire the art of the machine. Bring your children, grandchildren and plant a seed.






Over the last several years, a problem has cropped up for those of us that run engines designed back in the last century. Most of our old hot rods run either the original engine or one that has its design roots in the 50's to the 80's. The vast majority are running camshafts that use "flat" tappets, meaning tappets (or lifters or cam followers) that are relatively flat and slide along the lobe of the camshaft to actuate the valves. This sliding action places a tremendous load on the surfaces, at times exceeding 200,000 psi in a racing engine and about half that in our run-of-the-mill performance engines. The oil film often breaks down under these tremendous loads, and the result is severe lobe wear on the camshaft.

To prevent this wear, additives were developed many years ago. The best of these is zinc dialkyl-dithiophosphate, known as ZDDP or ZDP. I remember touring an ESSO (Canadian Exxon) oil research facility in 1985, and they told us how critical this additive was in promoting minimal wear at the camshaft. Back then, Pennzoil had these ads comparing Pennzoil with Z-7 (ZDDP) with oil not containing the additive. The ESSO guys said everyone used it, not just Pennzoil, and it was very effective.

Fast forward to the 21st century. It appears that the zinc and the phosphorus messes with the durability of the catalytic converter and the oxygen sensor, the two key players in the emission control systems of modern engines. At the same time, the manufacturers had begun redesigning the engines with roller lifters that literally roll along the surface of the cam on a



needle bearing. This reduces friction, increasing mileage and power, but also allowing ZDDP levels to be reduced, which of course was then mandated by the EPA. The maximum levels have dropped from 1500 ppm to 800 ppm, not enough for our old sleds.

What that means is that the latest and best motor oils aren't really the best for our old engines. So what can you do? Many owners are switching to diesel oils, which do have higher limits, though not 1500 ppm. I've recommended Shell Rotella T to several concerned owners. There are also racing oils that have levels very adequate for these older engines(\$). There are also additives that can be added to "regular" oil to boost the levels(\$\$). And, of course, the ultimate answer, where

possible, would be to do what the manufacturers did, and run a roller cam(\$\$\$). Ya pays yer money and ya takes yer choice, as I've said before. But think long and hard about doing nothing. A flat cam is an expensive thing to replace, but even worse, the metal that wears off can also wipe out the crank and bearings at the



same time(\$\$\$\$). If you are replacing a camshaft, the break-in lube and process is WAY more important than it used to be, and I've seen several camshafts over the years last less than 500 miles when proper break-in procedures were overlooked.


