

Snow Flake Pioneer Day Car Show



N THE HEADLIGHT



We had made a trip to Nor-Cal to do a few car shows with our newly done

Metropolitan. At our first show a gal from Utah fell in love with the car and



stipulation that it would be delivered after we had done the other shows we had signed up for. Our friend Ed had been looking for an old truck, and we were on our way to deliver the Met to Utah and stayed with Ed and his wife. We hoped to go check out the truck, but the owner was working and couldn't get with us. Ed moved on to other prospects, but I was still intrigued by this Stude truck. It looked like a good buy.

After delivering the Met, while heading for home, my wife Margie asked if I was really interested in the Stude, as we had time and money. We contacted our son in Las Vegas and he got me an airline ticket for the next day to Sacramento. I flew there, Ed and I checked out the truck.



I bought it and drove it to Vegas, then trailered it home from there. It had a Camaro front suspension and rear axle, a 350 Chevy engine and TH350 trans, a beautiful 3 inch exhaust system but no mufflers, a mess of an

electrical system, and a mediocre paint job over a fair amount of past body work. I later found that the bondo hid a lot of rust, and wound up replacing a large percentage of the sheet metal from another donor truck found in So-Cal.

We had several projects in the works, so the Stude sat for more than a year before I got to it. The engine was okay, but I acquired one that was fairly fresh with hi-po internals and installed it. Tranny was left alone other than resealing externally. Front suspension needed some attention, as did the brakes. Rebuilt the rear shackles. took out an overload leaf, and replaced shocks all the way around. While swapping cabs and beds, the chassis was cleaned and detailed. As mentioned, while stripping down the body, a lot of bad repairs and underlying rust was found, and it proved cheaper to buy another partial truck that was a failed project and use that cab and bed.

Margie doesn't care for the stock grille design, so I ended up grafting in a grille from a 58 Rambler that we

both agreed on. That and a custom lighted tailgate were the only body mods.

STUDEBAKER

I used a front bumper from a late 80's Chevy truck and a rear bumper from a Chevy Citation, and fabbed some custom tail lights. Basecoat/ clear coat two-tone paint was applied and buffed out.

Inside the cab, lots of changes were made. Steering column was swapped for a van



column, and the gauge cluster from the van was modified to fit. A Vintage Air A/C system was installed and the truck was completely rewired. Interior fabrics and colors had been chosen and purchased

early on and the exterior colors had been matched to them. The stock dash was covered with a flat metal plate covered with Birch veneer and a padded vinyl roll was added to the top. ABS sheet was used to form a new headliner backing to replace the missing cardboard stock one. Power windows were installed, and all glass and rubber was replaced. New door panels fabbed from ABS replaced the metal stock covers. Sound deadening was applied throughout the cab. The seats, armrest/cup holder and belt harnesses were sourced from a late 90's Taurus and fitted into place. New visors were built and new armrest/door pulls were fabbed. Then everything was covered or reupholstered through Margie's magic touch to finish out the interior.




A special bed cover was fabbed from steel tubing and aluminum sheet that lifts up and back electrically on a parallelogram linkage so that it creates a shade for seating at a

car show as well as security for cargo.

Although we had owned the truck for three years by the time we finished, it actually represents about 1200 hours of work. We enjoyed the truck for several months, then in early June we took the truck back to where it came from, NorCal, and traded it to our friend Ed for his

55 Chevy 210 and a 67 Chevy Step side pickup. Ed finally got the truck he really wanted, and we got more projects to keep us busy. Just what we need!





STAYING GROUNDED


I'll start out this month's tech article by telling a story on myself, so you can learn from my mistake. While still in school, I built a street-legal Corvair-powered "dune buggy", with a Chromoly tube frame and an aluminum skin. It was kind of ugly, but was real fast. I used stock Corvair suspension crossmembers front and rear, and to keep the battery close to the engine, I mounted it atop the rear crossmember just in front of the transaxle. I welded a pair of hold-down studs to the crossmember, and grounded the battery to one of the studs, then ran a short ground strap from the crossmember to the tranny, to which the starter was attached. For a long while, I had trouble getting it to crank like it should. After one session of cranking, I happened to grab the hold-down that the battery grounded through, and came away with "threadmark" burns on my hand. My weld was not as good as it could be, and I had a high-resistance ground




circuit that limited the amps the starter was getting. A ground strap from the battery directly to the transaxle cured all those problems.

Proper grounding of your hot rod's electrical system is essential, and is often taken for granted. Over my years of teaching, whenever I've been presented with a bizarre set of symptoms that even remotely involved the electrical system, the ground circuit is the first thing I checked. With electricity, remember that it must make a "round trip"- what goes out <u>must</u> come back. All too often, the assumption is made that if the wiring is good, and

the connections clean and tight, the system will function as designed. The ground side is often overlooked.





route them to some invisible location, and may end up with long ground paths that create problems.

Another issue that crops up is battery relocation. With a battery moved to the trunk, most (I hope) realize that a larger cable is needed to reduce losses. I like #1 or #0 welding cable. But just as important, the

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ground path is now much longer through a steel frame that is basically a lousy conductor. For best operation, a second cable should be run from the battery to the starter case.

Also, it's critical that the other electrical devices on the car ground well. There should be a ground strap from the battery to the frame and to the body, as well as to the engine. And if you happen to have a "glass" car or fiberglass parts, remember that a return path has to be provided for every electrical device attached to fiberglass. A ground wire with a screw will get you by on a steel car, but not on a glass one!

It truly is the little things that can drive you nuts. Take extra care with the ground half of your electrical system the next time you either wire up a car or try to sort out a problem. The stranger symptoms almost always come back to a basic problem that's been overlooked. It's much easier to do it right the first time at home, than to do it over in a hotel parking lot later! Happy Motoring—SF


