In Automotive History

Nov. 5, 1895

Selden Patent Granted: Despite not having a running or driving machine, George Selden manages to patent the concept of the self-propelled automobile. In theory all other manufactures would have to pay royalties to Selden or his assignees — he sold the patent rights in 1899 — should they manufacture a motor vehicle.



Nov. 6. 1899

First Packard Runs: James Ward Packard tests the single-cylinder motorcar bearing his name.

Nov. 8, 1895

Daimler Returns to Company He Founded: After an absence of two years, Gottlieb Daimler returns to Daimler-Motoren-Gesellschaft as chief engineer.



Nov. 9, 1960

Robert McNamara Named President of Ford: The motoring giant's new president is one of a group of bright executives known as the "Whiz Kids." He would ultimately leave Ford to become Secretary of Defense for John F. Kennedy and, later, Lyndon B. Johnson.

Nov. 12, 1998

Daimler-Chrysler Formed: Characterized as a "merger of equals," the Daimler-Chrysler merger brought new platforms to Highland Park, but also a new culture — a German one.

Nov. 13, 1940

Willys Jeep Prototype Presented: When the American military wanted a new utility vehicle, multiple companies were encouraged to bid. Prototypes from Bantam, Ford and Willys were ultimately shown to the Army's representatives.

Nov. 14, 1945

Indianapolis Motor Speedway Sold: Tony Hulman buys the IMS from World War I Ace Captain Eddie Rickenbacker.

Nov. 15, 1895

Ford Sets Production Record: The 100,000,000th Ford to be built in America rolls off of the assembly line at Ford's Mahwah, N.J., plant.

Nov. 16, 1929

Scuderia Ferrari Founded: Racing driver and automobile dealer Enzo Ferrari establishes his private racing team, which eventually grew to run the Alfa Romeo factory racing efforts and served as the root of his postwar automobile companies.

Nov. 17, 1998

Daimler-Chrysler listed on NYSE: For the first time, the newly created company is traded on the New York Stock Exchange.

Nov. 18, 1960 **Desoto to be Discontued:**Chrysler Corporation announces
that it will drop the DeSoto

that it will drop the DeSoto nameplate from its lineup. GOODBYE GIRL

Nov. 19, 1993

Toyota Cavalier Announced: Toyota and General Motors sign an agreement to offer the Chevy Cavalier in Japan, where it is sold as a Toyota.

Nov. 20, 1907

McLaughlin Motor Car Company Formed: Sam McLaughlin takes his Ontario company into the production of automobiles, and for his time the cars his company built were known as McLaughlin-Buicks. Ultimately, his company was merged into General Motors of Canada.

Nov. 23, 1897

Olds Receives Patent: Ransome E. Olds receives a patent for a "Motor-Carriage" to be powered by a gasoline engine.

Nov. 24, 1900

First Pierce-Arrow Driven: Powered by a modified deDion engine, the first Pierce-Arrow automobile — later called the "Motorette" — is driven through the streets of Buffalo.

Nov. 25, 1973

Sunday Gasoline Sales Banned: Facing an OPEC oil embargo and an approaching winter where some homes could run short of heating oil, President Richard M. Nixon on this date made a televised speech to announce an unprecedented step for saving gasoline: a ban on sales from 9 p.m. Saturdays through midnight Sundays, until the crisis eased.

Nov. 26, 1927

Ford Introduces the Model T's Replacement: In the days of Ford's one model policy, The Model A is announced as the company's new standard bearer. Just as sturdy, but more powerful and with a conventional manual



transmission, the Model A is an immediate success.

Nov. 28, 1895

Chicago Times Herald Race: J. Frank Duryea drives a car of his own manufacture to win the newspaper-sponsored race from Chicago to Waukegan.

Nov. 29. 1910

Street Traffic System Patented: Ernest E. Sirrine of Chicago patents what would be the first iteration of a traffic light. *This topic will be in next months Trivia page*.

Nov. 30, 1960

First Scout Completed: International Harvester's first Scout utility vehicle rolls out of the company's Fort Wayne plant.
